

CMWA 2006 Spring Hatteras Trip

When I saw Suzanne's request for an article on our spring trip to Hatteras, I wondered what I could say that hadn't been said before and would be of interest to her readers. As I thought about it I pondered the well-worn phrase that "life is a journey, not a destination". By the same token, much of what I enjoy about going to Hatteras is peripheral to the actual on water time.

In the past I have chronicled the camaraderie, the good food and the sailing venue. All of those things are well worth the trip. Some of the highlights this year were:

- Watching iron-man Jan on the water. Several days he and the Quebec sailors from Octaview put on jibing clinics around a couple of buoys as we watched from the deck. I once read in a windsurfing magazine that whenever there are two people on the water it is a race. This was no exception as we were all rooting for Jan to show those other guys his stuff. I must say that some of the Quebec sailors are very impressive.
- Seeing Lionel develop enough confidence in his cooking abilities to tell Jan how much pasta per serving we needed to cook. Unfortunately Jan eats somewhat more than the standard serving outlined on the package.
- Revisiting the great staff at the local shops. While
 there are so many, some like Art and Don at Fox
 deserve special mention for their laid back
 approach to customers. I find Margaret and Olaf at
 Avon Sailhouse special, but then they are ex-pats.
 (My personal feeling is that they deserve honorary
 CMWA membership.) Sadly Arthur, Mary and
 Jay have all left Windsurfing Hatteras.
- I know that this is a windsurfing newsletter but there are a number of us who kite. For those who do, check out Real's video Evolution. Mat does much of the narration and there is an extras section where they chat with many of the other counter and instructional staff.
- So how was the sailing? I am afraid it was the same old, same old. I sailed everything I had from a 3.3 to my 16 m kite. Some days were shorts, some were parka but you already know that about Hatteras. I was on the water 11 of 12 days that I was there. I am afraid that I bailed, faced with the prediction of two no-wind days before my final scheduled day.

Why would I leave this paradise early? As I alluded to at the beginning, it is about the journey. My traveling companion Bob, a first timer to Hatteras, and I spent two days returning via several disk golf courses. I know I mentioned this sport in one of my earlier articles but I will expand somewhat here.

For those who do know the game they might be more familiar with the term Frisbee Golf. Courses are set up in many parks and are generally free to play. The rules are pretty much the same as ball golf in that you count the strokes to sink your disk in a basket. I find this a great way to break up trips such as the one to Hatteras. Courses can be located by checking the Professional Disk Golf Web Site http://www.pdga.com/course/index.php. All of the information can also be loaded onto a Palm. I use the Microsoft Streets and Maps with the GPS add on with my laptop so that I can locate the nearest course when I feel like a break. I usually stop at Warrendale near Pittsburgh on the way down but there is a great course near Monroeville for beginners.

On our way back this time, I stopped at two courses that I had not played before, the first called the Grange near Sportsylvania, Virginia. This location had two regulation courses and a mini style course with lights for night play. It had a campground and an outdoor kitchen complete with pizza oven.

The second was in Moraine State Park in Pennsylvania. I was unfamiliar with this park but see in their brochure that it is visited by one million people per year. Bob was so impressed by the gently rolling terrain and smooth paving on the park road that he is thinking of returning with his bicycle.

At every one of these courses, I meet other players and chat about the local scene much like windsurfers do at the beach. The sport is a great compliment to people who depend on windy days for action. I challenge readers to check the website and go check out their local course. There is one at Camp Fortune and one in Cartier Park. There is one on Toronto Island and a number of others around the city. I also found that if you travel on business, the disks were small enough to be taken on trips for some those non-business hours.

Those are some of the things that make my two weeks a journey, not just a sailing destination. I could relate many more but I don't want to lose Suzanne's members! ❖

RS:X News

WINDSURFING EQUIPMENT

The first major head to head competition between the recently selected 2008 Beijing Windsurfing equipment, the RS:X, and the much older and original hybrid design, the Mistral Prodigy, occurred at the Calema Windsurfing Midwinters, Mar 3-5, at Cocoa Beach, Florida. The popular and less costly Prodigy narrowly missed being selected for the next Olympic Games at the race-off in Italy last year. Interestingly enough, at the Midwinter Championship, where the Prodigys and RS:Xs started together as one fleet and sailed the same course, the Prodigys exhibited equal or better board speed in most wind conditions, particularly in lighter winds, despite having an 8.5 meter sail versus the RS:X's larger 9.5 meter sail.

Final results do show the RS:X in the top 4 positions, but then again, these were sailed by Olympic contenders (US Ben Barger 1st, and Canadian Alain Bolduc 2nd). Amazingly, the fastest board of all was sailed by Dave Stanger of Charleston, SC, a 52 year old and a grandfather. Stanger was on a (gasp) long board with a 7.5 meter sail! He finished just 2 points behind the leader, Ben Barger, starting at the same time and sailing the same course. In one race, Stanger was far ahead, stopped in midcourse to locate the finish line and lost several places. Have we made progress or what? BTW, average age of Prodigy sailors competing was also 52 years. ~ Dick Tillman
